

This book is a powerful synthesis of many important topics related to social justice in higher education, seamlessly weaving together macro and micro issues. Throughout the book, Davis and Harrison focus on the systemic nature of oppression without belittling the individual. Individual interactions matter, and Davis & Harrison provide some examples of how individuals can â œadvance social justice,â • but these will not make meaningful change in our world if we do not address the systemic issues as well. Davis and Harrison pose important questions to help readers think critically about the issues they discuss (e.g., the history of higher education and the role of media). They also highlight important paradigmatic issues and the critical role that educators play (e.g., â œbeing in itâ • vs. â œgetting itâ • and the emotional process of being an educator). I thoroughly enjoyed this book, and assigned large portions of it to a masters level course I co-taught this year; the students appreciated the points raised and it sparked wonderful discussion and activities. I strongly recommend it to individuals in higher education looking for another perspective on how we can move forward for a more equitable world!

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
